GENESIS: THE ORIGINS OF A SONG

Turn Your Radio On

by Mary Calvert Brown (aka Lady Outlaw)

Turn Your Radio On, a beloved "Southern gospel" song, was written in 1937 by Albert Edward Brumley Sr. (1905-1977) and first recorded by Lulu Belle & Scotty in the style of Western swing in 1939. It has since been performed in a diversity of styles by artists such as The Blue Sky Boys, John Hartford, Johnny Cash, Reba McIntire, Elvis Presley, Roy Acuff, The Statler Brothers, Ray Stevens, and many others.

Albert Brumley himself said, "I wrote *Turn Your Radio On* in 1937, and it was published in 1938. At this time radio was relatively new to the rural people, especially gospel music programs. I had become alert to the necessity of creating song titles, themes, and plots, and frequently people would call me and say, 'Turn



your radio on,
Albert, they're
singing one of your
songs on suchand-such a
station.' It finally
dawned on me to
use their quote,
'Turn your radio
on,' as a theme for
a religious
originated song,
and this was the

Albert Brumley originated song, and this was the beginning of *Turn Your On* as we know it."

The growth of the fledgling broadcast radio industry was partly fueled by the spread of the electric power

grid, especially in the rural areas of America. This facilitated the spread of information in a way never before experienced in history. Radio became known as the "theater of the mind." Families gathered around their radios to listen to their favorite stories and shows, and the power of radio was evidenced by Orson Welles broadcast of the H. G. Welles classic *War of the Worlds* on October 30, 1938. News, sports, entertainment, and information became available, captivating and inspiring a nation.

Albert Brumley was one of the most successful American gospel composers of the twentieth century, also writing such standards as I'll Fly Away, I'll Meet You in the Morning, Jesus Hold My Hand, If We Never Meet Again, and hundreds of others.

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Turn Your Radio On

Thanks to their widespread use among early radio and recording artists, several of Brumley's songs have become extremely popular among the general public.

Born to hard-working sharecroppers in Indian Territory near present day Spiro, Oklahoma, he was raised in a musical and religious environment. His parents were firmly committed Campbellite Protestants, but his father was also a noted fiddler.

Music was integral to the family's weekly church gatherings and house parties. When he entered school, Brumley was a painfully shy "skinny kid", who never muscled up as country boys often did, although he participated in baseball, softball, and foot races. However, the first thing people noticed about him was his rich bass voice.

After completing the tenth grade at public schools in Rock Island, Oklahoma, he participated in his first singing school there at age sixteen. Usually lasting three weeks, these schools were led by itinerant teachers who taught shape-note singing, also known as fa-sol-la singing. Each of the seven notes has a distinctive geometric shape, a style primarily used in religious/gospel songs. Proficient musicians will see the tune instead of reading the notes. This was the start of his lifelong passion for gospel music.

In 1926, Brumley left the family farm virtually penniless and headed for Hartford, Arkansas, hoping to enroll in Eugene Monroe Bartlett's renowned Hartford Music Institute. Bartlett, also owner of the Hartford Music Company, had helped many young people receive an education and get started in the music world. He graciously took Brumley under his wing, even providing room and board at his own home. His kindness paid off; Brumley published his first song for Hartford in 1927 (I Can Hear Them Singing Over There) and eventually became one of Bartlett's finest staff songwriters. Bartlett died in 1941, but Brumley forever credited him as the chief mentor and inspiration behind his music.

In 1931, Brumley married Goldie Schell, moved to Powell, Missouri, and had five sons and a daughter. In 1943, Brumley started his own publishing company, Albert E. Brumley and Sons, and purchased the Hartford Music Company in 1948, acquiring copyrights to several of his most successful songs. His sons followed him into the music business, and one continued to operate the publishing firm after Brumley's death in 1977. He was inducted into many halls of fame, and in a study of gospel music the Smithsonian Institution wrote that he was the "greatest white gospel songwriter before World War II."

The Skillet Lickers

What has not been written about a band that has evolved through 95 years and is active today through the 4th generation of one of the founding members? How many pages could be allotted by the SEBA Newsletter for stories about it?

The Skillet Lickers is a seminal band in American popular music. An internet search will turn up results that include a Wikipedia page, their website, their Facebook page, and numerous other results including one that credits them as an influence for every form of popular music in American excepting jazz that developed from what was called folk music in the time of the original lineup.

The 1926 Originals

Gid Tanner had been performing locally around Dacula and north Georgia. He was on WSB radio in Atlanta in 1922 on their program that preceded the 1924 broadcast on WSM in Nashville that

became The Grand Ole Opry in 1926. Readers should look up the book "Pickin' on Peachtree" to learn more about Atlanta's place in early popular music history and maybe how Atlanta missed becoming Music City.

The first lineup was drawn together in 1926 as a recording band for Columbia Records with Gid Tanner from Dacula on fiddle, Riley Puckett from Atlanta on guitar, Fate Norris from Dalton on harmonica and banjo, and Clayton McMitchen from Atlanta also on fiddle. It may have been christened as "The Skillet Lickers" by Frank Walker, the artist & repertoire representative who arranged the session. This was well before the 1927 Bristol Sessions that have been called The Big Bang that started modern country music. The first lineup, which disbanded in 1931, recorded 88 tunes and had 82 issued by Columbia. Look for the recordings through online sources.

The Skillet Lickers, like many bands today, drew in musicians in their area to perform and the lineup varied as musicians were available with members of the Tanner family always in the band. They notably recorded "Down Yonder" in 1934 in San Antonio, Texas with Gid's son, Gordon, on fiddle. They also recorded "Back Up and Push", "Soldiers' Joy", "Ida Red", "The Boll Weevil Song" and other tunes that influenced and were incorporated by musicians such as Bob Wills, Tex Ritter, and Willie Nelson.

The Skillet Lickers had a sort of knock-around period in the 1940s through 50s by varying the lineup and playing at schools, on radio shows, at square dances, and busking. Gid passed in 1960 and Gordon continued, although not as vigorously as the music could not support a family. Gordon's son, Phil, had picked up playing at about the age of 10 and had an informal bunch in high school when their Ag teacher suggested they practice and enter the county FFA band contest. This bunch included Fleet Stanley, nephew of Roba Stanley who was one of the first women to record country music. This lineup won the county contest and went to the state competition where they did well but did not take first place.

From this experience, Phil continued playing, first calling the band The Junior Skillet Lickers and then The Skillet Lickers, as they are known today. Through the years, the lineup has varied as musicians were available and has included Gerald Bailey, Red Bailey, Jimmy Hooper, Ray Coggins, Doug Landress, (Smokey) Joe Miller, Julian McDaniel, Linton Wages, Bobby Martin, Joel Aderhold, Brian Stephens, UGA musicologist Art Rosenbaum, and, once, Bill Long. The band name has even attracted attention in the big band genre and the name was incorporated by San Francisco-based singer Lavay Smith who fronts a band billed as The Red Hot Skillet Lickers.

Russ Tanner, the 4th generation of the family to continue with the band, plays fiddle and books the band. His son, Josh, manages their online presence and podcasts. The legacy of this historic band may not be well-known outside those interested music locally and historically, although the 1927 lineup was in the first bunch honored when the Atlanta Country Music Hall of Fame was organized and they are remembered by the Georgia Music Hall of Fame, now associated with UGA in Athens, and the Country Music Hall of Fame, Nashville where one of Gid's fiddles is in the museum. The Skillet Lickers continues today playing what Phil & Russ call good music, not limited by genres that segmented the industry since the band began. Their tunes are those that interest them, that are fun to play, and entertaining to their audiences. Their live appearances in recent years have been limited by the coronavirus epidemic and they do not have bookings in 2022. But, stay tuned, the music never stops and *support live music!*

The Chicken House in Jefferson, GA, is on property that was formerly Gordon Tanner's farm and is now owned by Russ Tanner of The Skillet Lickers. Long after it was no longer used as a chicken house, it was used for practice and jamming. It started with a dirt floor and a wood burning stove. Gordon traded a fiddle for a friend to pour a concrete floor and over time linoleum, windows, a restroom, and heating and air conditioning have been added. The band and local musicians would gather on Friday nights to practice and jam and friends would come to listen and socialize. I stumbled into the scene through a neighbor who was hosting a western swing jam when Phil told me about his jam and I went just about every Friday night for about 10 years. The jam is currently on hold with the coronavirus.

We will let you know when the Chicken House jams start up again. This is a great place to get you back to the roots of our Music. The Eds

Living in Canton, I had made the long drive to the Tuesday evening **Marietta Square jam** quite often. Being a new jammer and wannabe musician, I really enjoyed jamming with the great musicians there at the square. Then came Covid.....

After about a year of being shut in, cabin fever set in and I was craving to start jamming again. I didn't know if anyone was jamming in my area and the Marietta jams had not restarted yet. I remember jamming once at the gazebo in Woodstock during their annual "Bacon & Banjos" a couple years earlier and had this crazy idea of using the gazebo for an outside jam where we could perhaps have a little social distancing. My wife Sallie and I met with the head of Woodstock Parks & Recreation and discussed the possibility of holding a regular jam there. Long story short, the red tape was so involved that we decided it wasn't worth the hassle.

Not to be deterred, we approached the Canton Downtown Development manager, **Velinda Hardy**, about having a jam in downtown **Canton Cannon Park** at their gazebo. She welcomed us and was excited to have us. Our first jam was November 7, 2020. I guess there were a lot of others in the "Northern" area that had cabin fever because there were about 30 people that showed up. Unbelievably, we had 5 bass players show up that first day. (Thank goodness a few of them had other instruments to switch to).

You'll probably never see that many bass players in one place ever again.

The Northern jams were born.

Since the jams started in November, the outside gazebo jam was doomed to have a short life due to the cold weather about to set in. Serendipity struck in the form of SEBA member, and banjo player, Joey Jordan. As luck would have it, his daughter, Aly Tally, attended one of the gazebo jams with him. Aly is the Community Creative Coordinator for the Reformation Brewery in Canton. She overheard my wife Sallie and me discussing our search for an indoor venue for the jam and invited us to have our jam at their brewery on Saturdays and it's been there ever since. This led to a Wednesday jam at the **Reformation** Brewery's Woodstock location jam on Wednesdays.

The Ball Ground Jam is born...

Using the same strategy, we were able to obtain the Ball Ground city park for jams on Sundays. This jam location is well suited for the Cumming residents and more northern residents such as Jasper and Ellijay to attend. This jam turned out to be a great success as well. With the help of Mary Russo, Don Walker and Jimmy Minks, we were able to obtain an indoor venue at the RockSolid Brewery in downtown Ball Ground for the winter months. The acoustics are not great inside but it's better than no jam at all. Spring will bring out many more jammers.

After the free ad expires, members may extend the ad or purchase a new 3- month ad for a cost of \$10. Want ads are limited to a maximum of 50 words in length.


