Bear On The Square - Continued

In April 1997 a committee was organized to create an annual festival to commemorate the visit of the black bear cub to the Public Square. As their website says, "The stated purpose of the first festival was to celebrate traditional Appalachian music and crafts but to also celebrate the natural



world of the mountains with information on bears." My wife, kids and I happened to be riding around the area that weekend and stumbled upon this first small event of musicians playing on the square. It was so refreshing to hear the beautiful soothing sounds of the true Appalachian Traditional music we instantly became hooked. I had been playing Bluegrass a little but now it was my focus and passion. I have attended every year since.



The festivals have grown bigger and better every year reaching a climax {just prior to the shutdowns} of some 22,000 folks attending, playing music and 100's of tent vendors from all over showing off their arts and crafts. Hundreds of well known Bluegrass Bands and individuals have performed in the Theater, the BIG

TENT and local establishments, folks from as far away as Japan, Kenya Africa and European countries have been seen joining in to play.

My SEBA Member Band "The Mars Hill Porch Pickers" has been attending the "BEAR ON THE SQUARE FESTIVALS" every year for the past 20 years. We setup sitting under the sycamore trees right near the tree where the hand carved replica of the cub is. We also jam around the SOUTHEASTERN BLUEGRASS ASSOCIATION'S WELCOME TENT on the courthouse square. We enjoy this very happy and inviting, traditional musical atmosphere. The people and musicians are in their own elements on every corner, in-between the streets, on the front porches, sidewalks and everywhere you go. There have been yearly increases in the number of musicians who come to play where everyone is welcome to join in no matter if you're young or old, a

beginner or experienced. We all greet each other with warm Appalachian tunes and fast moving Bluegrass Music along with intense appreciation for everyone's talents, singing abilities and instrumental qualities, no matter how young or old the musicians.



Sometimes on Friday nights

before the festival you can hear casual small group jams going as some of the vendors are finishing setting up their wares. Saturdays are slammed full of wonderful Bluegrass and Appalachian music no matter where you choose to roam on the square or on the back streets and in the restaurants. Sundays are opened up with a Bagpiper strolling through playing Amazing Grace. The around 9:30 am a group of folks will start leading a Bluegrass Gospel sessions that lasts a good 2 hours. Sometimes you can catch Gospel music being played

in tents off to the side of the square until around 11:30 or12 noon. Then the final afternoon of Bluegrass and Appalachian music fills the air for the fresh batch of folks who have driven from faraway places to see, taste, feel, experience and hear the "Toe Tappin' Bluegrass ~ Ear Candy of the Mountains".

LADY OUTLAW'S KITCHEN

Lady Outlaw's Chocolate Moonshine Cupcakes

Be popular! Win friends and influence people! (And no, this is not a Dale Carnegie course.) You, too, can become even more welcome anywhere by simply learning how to bake cupcakes with this foolproof recipe from Lady Outlaw's Kitchen. Make your arrival at any chosen event eagerly anticipated!

First and foremost, make sure your food preparation area is clean and sanitary. If you have house cats, be sure and disinfect the kitchen counters before starting to bake—need I say more? And I will refrain

from providing details about the occasion when I brought a supply of disposable latex gloves to a coworker's bachelorette party, along with plenty of cash. By the next workday, everyone in the entire company knew about it---but that's another story. At the time, I was working in a clinical lab where we would all take what were known as "universal precautions", meaning that anything could possibly spread disease germs and proper protocols had to be followed for health and safety.

So here's the recipe for Lady Outlaw's chocolate moonshine cupcakes—basically a pound cake recipe that's rich enough to where it doesn't need icing. Use the smallest size cupcake papers to create more surface area so that the crust will serve the purpose of icing. I've tried it with muffin top papers but it's better as cupcakes. And if you use an aluminum or Teflon muffin tin, be sure to use the cupcake papers—makes it easier to clean up and besides, aluminum has been suspected of contributing to Alzheimer's disease. And you don't want the Teflon chemicals getting into your cooking anyway.

Ingredients:

- 2 sticks softened butter
- 8 oz sour cream
- 3 cups sugar
- 6 eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

- 2 1/4 cups cake flour**
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 3/4 cup unsweetened cocoa powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- dash of Sweetwater Shine® 100 proof*

Preheat the oven to 325 °F. Place mini cupcake papers in a mini muffin tin.

Using an electric mixer, cream together the butter, sour cream and sugar. Add the eggs, 2 at a time, beating well after each addition. Add the vanilla.

In another bowl, stir together the flour, baking powder, salt, and cocoa. Add 1/2 the flour mixture to the creamed mixture, beat well, add the remaining 1/2 flour mixture, and continue to beat at medium speed for 2 minutes. Pour the batter into the cupcake papers and bake about 15-20 minutes or until they don't make a depression when touched. One clue that they're almost done is when they start to smell delicious. Check carefully—do not overbake. Makes lots of cupcakes—if you want to cut the recipe in half or bake it in a loaf pan, that's ok, too—just watch the baking time and check it when the delightful aroma starts drifting around the kitchen.

If you want to get fancy, serve with real whipped cream topped with grated chocolate. And make up the whipped cream yourself—it's much better than the canned variety. You can add sugar and a dash of vanilla extract to taste before whipping up the heavy cream. It's easier to use an electric mixer or blender if one is available—I am a great believer in modern kitchen technology. Or you could do it by hand with a wire whisk, but that's a lot more work. Have it your way and enjoy!

**To make 1 cup of cake flour, put 2 tablespoons cornstarch into a measuring cup, and fill with flour to make 1 cup total.

Our attendance is down quite a bit (both musicians and audience) but we anticipate a revival along with warmer weather and a further decline in the number of Covid 19 cases.

I'll let the 2002 article by Laurie Searle speak for itself. We welcome pickers, singers and friends. We are still acoustic with microphones for singers. The building is located at **9285 Cedar Grove Rd, Fairburn, GA 30213**.

Making Music in the Hill Country - "Down at Cedar Grove"

Bring a pie, a friend, and an acoustic instrument. It's music night in Cedar Grove. Folks have been flocking to the Cedar Grove Community House every Tuesday night for over 10 years to pick some music, sing some songs, and shake some hands. At least that's how homegrown guitar player Gene Terry tells it in the song he wrote, "Down at Cedar Grove." "I wrote that song about four years ago," said Gene, who sports a trim white beard, baseball cap, and golden guitar. And in true southern style, it tells the story about the folks who come to Cedar Grove, the music they play, and their community, which has grown as tightly knit as any family. The story begins around 14 years ago, give or take a few, in the Fairburn home of Ruth and Gene West. Ruth and Gene were big Bluegrass music fans and would invite neighbors over once a week to play a little



music. "We started out in one room," says Ruth, who picks the largest Bluegrass instrument, the "dog house" bass. But as friends told friends about the weekly gathering, they soon needed a larger meeting place

They found the perfect meeting place at the Cedar Grove Community House, which is part of Fulton County Parks & Recreation. It features all of the comforts of home including one main room large enough to hold family and friends, a kitchen and long counter ready to serve up pies, cookies, and assorted treats, and rest room facilities to accommodate male and female guests.



Over the years, Ruth has taken on the unofficial role of master of ceremonies. But since this is more like a family reunion than a concert, Ruth begins each meeting with a prayer, then asks if there are any birthdays, anniversaries, or anyone in the community that is ill and might need some special visits. Once all of the community news is covered, it's on with the music! How's it work? The formula is simple: refreshments + friends + music = a good time. Jan Lassiter arrives early to set up refreshments, with the help

and donations from many community members. Meanwhile, husband James unloads the sound equipment and helps set it up before everyone arrives. Just before 7 p.m., friends and family begin to arrive. On a slow night there might be 40 folks but tonight there's closer to 80.

As for the music, anyone is welcome to play an acoustic instrument, sing a song, or dance a little, if the mood strikes. Each person gets a turn to play 3 or 4 songs, and it they want specific folks to back them up, those folks step up to the microphone, too. Everyone else is welcome to play along in the background.

Al Ward from Douglasville steps up the microphone to sing his first song, "It Makes No Difference Now." Al, who has been playing guitar since he was 10 years old, recalls the time he broke up his band back in 1945. "I started playing with a group called **Blue Bonnet Boys & Louise**, back in 1942," Al recalls. Back then, he was the only one in the band with a car, so he'd drive the band April 2022

to all of its jobs. When Al finished high school in 1945, he was drafted, leaving **Blue Bonnet Boys & Louise** with no way to get to its jobs. The band broke up for about a year then reunited once Al returned home from the service in 1946.

Back near the kitchen, Randa and Herschel Pitts from Douglas county, strike a pose as they enjoy Al's next song. Neither play an instrument, but come to Cedar Grove each



week to enjoy the music and fellowship. Randa is a volunteer for the Disabled

American Veterans and promotes Bluegrass music at its semiannual festival in Carrollton, GA. She is very proud that the festival raised \$2,300 in April and has brought a flyer announcing the upcoming festival on October 11-12. Randa and Herschel have been married six years and are newlyweds compared to most folks at Cedar Grove. In the tradition of extending the music community by word of mouth, Randa and Herschel told Darel Gray about Cedar Grove and tonight is his first night here. Like his friends, Darel isn't a musician; he's a promoter of sorts. "I got into setting up the sound for Bluegrass because I was always into electronics of some sort," Darel said. He also confided that he introduces young folks to Bluegrass music by adding musical snippets to the basketball videos he produces professionally/

It's a second-time visit for Corky Check who came in from Winston, GA, to sing a few songs tonight. You would never guess it by looking at Corky, who's stage presence is on par with that of a professional gospel singer, but he's a little nervous. He's more used to singing with backup music recorded on tape than with live musicians so he's not quite

sure what to expect. Corky soon discovers that it's a great



experience making music at Cedar Grove. Everyone is behind you, 100 percent, whether you're a seasoned musician or it's your first time playing. Everyone is your friend and neighbor, whether you grew up next door to them or met them for the first time tonight. And everyone is invited to join in the good old fashioned, wholesome fun.



Why not stop by next Tuesday night at 7p.m. and enjoy some music with your Hill Country neighbors Down at Cedar Grove? The Cedar Grove Community house is located at 9285 Cedar Grove Road, on the South Fulton Scenic Byway, just north of the intersection of Cedar Grove/Hwy 70 and Cochran Mill Road. 
