The Editor's Editorial

These days, our SEBA Membership base is low. In order for SEBA to be the powerful resource that it could be for our Bluegrass Community, we need a larger, stronger Membership base so we can promote Bluegrass Music and bring it to the community through performers, instructors, jam sessions, venues and events, and providing information to all through our publications (that's our Mission Statement).

Attendance at the Chapter Meetings/Jams is low and some Chapters are not even meeting at this time.

What can we do as an Organization to grow and have the strength to fulfill our Mission?

One SEBA Member offers this observation: There is no incentive for a musician to join SEBA. If you think about it, there are untold numbers of jams available in the state. Logically, there are more in metro Atlanta because of the population density, but I'd guess that around every chapter location there are a fair number of jams that take place. In most places, bored pickers can pick up the phone, make a few calls, and in no time an impromptu jam is happening.

For example: In the tri-state north Georgia —western North Carolina —northwestern South Carolina area, music and pickers are a way of life. Up there you can find many picking havens, any of which are also jam havens. The common thread is that there is no admission to attend a jam — that's just not the way it's done. This includes SEBA jams. For better or worse, richer or poorer, a normal reaction for anyone is not to buy the cow when you're already getting the milk for free.

For some Members, we are willing to join and contribute financially as a means of supporting the organization. We believe in it. Others who are able volunteer their time and services to help with the administrative tasks attendant to SEBA – like the way SEBA contributed to Bear On The Square Festival, to the youth organizations, and in supporting this Breakdown newsletter.

What it comes down to for SEBA is that the jams attract more non-members than members. Similarly, for those whose income is fixed, intolerably low, and the circumstances demand that every dollar – every penny – must be watched and accounted for, a jam that doesn't require membership is (in many cases) a dream come true. They may be able to attend a limited number of jams per month, gas prices notwithstanding. There is no incentive to budget for SEBA dues when they can't afford to or don't need to.

Another concern is the inability on the part of the organization to incentivize membership from any sort of interested parties. This is no fault of the SEBA folks they are subject to the same conditions mentioned above. It's extremely difficult to acquire paying members when there is no need for a prospective member to actually pay dues. There is no better example of this than the demographic representation at a SEBA jam. There are routinely a fair representation of non-dues paying members. Nor is it easy to keep renewals up when existing members can simply stop paying dues without the penalty of not being permitted to attend jams.

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This is a natural occurrence in such a situation and in many ways understandable. A logical concern for those of us who want the organization to thrive is... where does SEBA go from here? What, if any, plans are being consided for membership growth? Can we hope to grow the organization with paying members through some sort of drive to impart the same kind of support that we have to new or existing members who may not realize the needs of the SEBA chapters?

From the Eds:. The SEBA Board members are aware of this situation and have been talking about it and trying to figure what to do about it but, so far, no Grand Solution has presented itself.

SEBA does have value – see the first page of this Breakdown where we presented a \$1,000 check to the Pick and Bow

Traditional Music School (Dahlonega, GA) and an additional scholarship for \$1,000 was sent to Young Appalachian Musicians (Pickens, SC). This helps to bring a new generation of youngsters into the Bluegrass community.

However, in order for SEBA to be the powerful resource that it could be for our Bluegrass Community, we need a larger, stronger Membership base so we can promote Bluegrass Music and bring it to the community through performers, instructors, jam sessions, venues and events, and providing information to all through our publications (that's our Mission Statement).

LADY OUTLAW'S KITCHEN

Lemon Moonshine Gingerbread from the Sweetwater Shine® Test Kitchens

Here's another great recipe for summer bluegrass events, picnics, parties, and just about everything else from New Year's Eve to Christmas. If you are new to the kitchen, this is a great way to learn to cook—just like I did when I was a kid, except I used cake mixes until my great-aunt turned me on to really good baking. Haven't picked up a cake mix since.

Ever wonder what's in these commercial products? Once I read the ingredients list on some highly questionable canned cake frosting—it used *beef fat*! (I didn't eat any of it.) Make your own cakes, folks! That way you know what's in them—like real butter, whole wheat flour, molasses, fresh ginger, fresh lemon—the good list goes on and on. But first and foremost, food safety.

The following is a public service message from the Sweetwater Shine® Test Kitchens:

Be aware that the kitchen is not without a certain degree of unexpected dangers. A friend who owned a restaurant was required to take courses in food terrorism. However, you can easily get food poisoning on your own without much help from the jihadists. So always take proper precautions for food safety.

First, wash your hands and food preparation utensils and surfaces. Be aware that some foods of animal origin are more associated with foodborne illnesses and food poisoning than others. They can carry pathogenic microorganisms that can make you very sick if the food is contaminated. Raw meat, poultry, seafood, and eggs can spread germs to ready-to-eat foods—unless you keep them separate. Cook to the right temperature and follow recommended cooking times. Refrigerate promptly--Bacteria can multiply rapidly if left at room temperature or in the "Danger Zone" between 40°F and 140°F. Never thaw foods on the counter because bacteria multiply quickly in the parts of the food that reach room temperature. And wash your cutting board with soap and hot water after using it for raw chicken, especially!

Years ago I worked as a paramedic with Grady Hospital Ambulance—some of my patients with stomach pain had eaten such unspeakable cuisine as six hot dogs from the Varsity, a pig ear sandwich with four ounces of gin, and—now get this---some sausage that had been sitting out unrefrigerated for two days. (That last young man was rolling on the floor in agony.) Be careful to avoid these culinary disasters. My own rule of thumb is, if it tastes funny, spit it out! Especially if somebody in the house is mad at you or has designs on your sizable life insurance policy. Also, never swipe other people's lunches in the office refrigerator—they can come up with some "creative additives".

Enough of the lecture—now it's time to visit Lady Outlaw's Kitchen.

Ingredients

- 1 cup molasses
- 1/2 cup boiling water
- 5 Tablespoons softened butter
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons fresh grated ginger

- 2 Tablespoons fresh grated organic lemon peel
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 Tablespoons wheat bran
- 2 cups whole wheat flour, minus 2 Tablespoons (the flour and bran should equal 2 cups total)

 Dash of Sweetwater Shine® 100 proof

Directions

- 1. Place the molasses and softened butter in a medium mixing bowl.
- 2. Add the boiling water and stir until well mixed and the butter has melted.
- 3. Add the lemon peel, ginger, Sweetwater Shine® and baking soda--stir lightly.
- 4. Add the flour and salt only enough to moisten and mix the ingredients. Don't worry if it isn't perfectly smooth. Do not over mix!
- 5. Turn into an ungreased baking pan in a preheated oven at 375 degrees F. Bake for 25 to 35 minutes (ovens vary) or until the top springs back when lightly pressed and the bread begins to pull away from the sides of the pan. Do not overbake. Check it when the delicious aroma starts drifting around the kitchen—the best clue to see if it's getting done yet. You can also make it into mini cupcakes—use the little papers to line a muffin tin for easy cleanup and bake for about 10 minutes.
- 6. Serve with whipped cream and your favorite lemon sauce.


