Charlie Poole, Banjo Virtuoso

Charlie Poole was an early practitioner of three-finger style banjo. While he did not originate this style, he was one of the most influential banjo pickers in the early 20th century. You may not have his records, but you have probably heard several of his songs at any Bluegrass jam.


Charlie was born on March 22, 1892, in Randolph County, North Carolina. Charlie made a banjo out of a gourd when he was about eight or nine years old, and began learning to play it from his cousin, Daner Johnson.

Charlie began working at a cotton mill at an early age. Soon he had enough money to buy his first commercially made banjo. It was an Orpheum Number 3 Special and he bought it for \$1.50. (Wonder what it would be worth today?)



At the age of 26 Charlie moved to the town of Spray, North Carolina, located in Rockingham County.

Spray had a thriving music scene then, and Charlie settled right in. He met a fiddle player named Posey Rorer soon after his arrival in Spray. Charlie and Posey formed a partnership, but it did not instantly become a band. Instead, their main business was distributing moonshine. They would drum up business by playing music together, and this inevitably led to the formation of a string band, with Norman Woodlief as the third member on guitar. They called themselves the North Carolina Ramblers, and became immensely popular around North Carolina, Virginia, and West Virginia.



Daner was a great admirer of Fred Van Eps, a renowned banjo picker of the early 20th century. While Van Eps' style is far removed from bluegrass, he learned to play the banjo by listening to cylinder records made by Vess Ossman, who frequently used three and sometimes even four or all five fingers of their picking hand, rather than the older clawhammer style. This may be where Charlie learned his three-finger style of picking.

On the other hand, he once bet that he could catch a baseball without a glove. He permanently injured his right hand, and some say that he developed his three-finger style to compensate for this injury. In any event, he was picking with three fingers long before the advent of Bluegrass!

By 1925, Charlie Poole and the North Carolina Ramblers were popular enough to audition for a recording company. They were signed up on the spot. At their very first recording session they cut "Don't Let Your Deal Go Down Blues," "Can I Sleep In Your Barn Tonight Mister," "The Girl I Left In Sunny Tennessee," and "The Man That Rode The Mule Around The World". Their first release consisted of the first two songs listed above, and it was a big hit for its day.

Charlie continued to record successfully through 1930. The lineup of the North Carolina Ramblers changed from time to time, and they also changed their name at times so they could record on different labels. By 1930 the Great Depression had taken hold, and both record sales and personal appearances diminished drastically.

Charlie Poole could be considered a forerunner of such recent country artists as Hank Williams, Johnny Cash, George Jones, and many others.

There is a reason Charlie Poole is not smiling in any of his photographs. In one of the many incidents, he smashed his banjo over a policeman's head, and the policeman's partner tried to shoot Poole in the head, and the shot wound up chipping his front teeth. There were many other incidents, and when the Depression cut into his income, his fondness for alcohol became worse.

The year 1931 could have been the highlight of his career, but it turned to tragedy instead. A major motion picture studio offered him a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to provide the soundtracks for their movies. Of course, this ray of hope delighted him. Unfortunately, he celebrated much too long and too enthusiastically.

His friends found him at the local post office, too drunk to even sing a song. He said, "Old Charlie's sung all night long, Old Charlie's been drunk a lot of time but this time old Charlie's gonna kick the bucket." His friends physically carried him to his sister's house where he had a heart attack that night before he could ever leave North Carolina to go to California.

Do not judge Charlie Poole's legacy by his tragic ending, however. He was immensely popular in North Carolina in his day, and many local North Carolina musicians tried their best to emulate his style of playing the banjo. Many of his recordings do not showcase his style of

banjo picking. Unlike many banjo pickers, he was also the lead vocalist on most of his records, but he never took solo instrumental breaks on his vocal records.

Likewise, his instrumental records were frequently fiddle tunes, which feature "old time" style playing in which the banjo never takes a solo break.

The best examples of his banjo picking are "Don't Let Your Deal Go Down Medley" (not "Don't Let Your Deal Go Down Blues," same tune but different recording) and "Southern Medley."

He influenced many North Carolina banjo players who followed in his footsteps by using a three-finger style of picking. It is especially noteworthy that Earl Scruggs was born in Flint Hill, North Carolina (only about 60 miles from Charlie Poole's home of Spray, NC), and he noted that he knew of other banjo pickers in the area who already used a three-finger style, probably influenced by Charlie Poole.

There is no doubt that Earl Scruggs developed a style that is in a completely different league from any previous style of picking, but the use of three fingers of the picking hand was not unique to him.


Charlie Poole's legacy also includes the fact that many of the songs he recorded have become an integral part of the Bluegrass repertoire. In addition to the first four songs he recorded, the list includes "Sweet Sunny South," "He Rambled," "If The River Was Whiskey" (also known as "Hesitation Blues"), "White House Blues," "If I Lose, I Don't Care," and "Ragtime Annie," among others.

DRESS FOR BLUEGRASS SUCCESS

"We don't need no lavender cowboys around here!"

Many of you will recall the famous fashion statement from the movie Tumbling Tumbleweeds where Gene Autry sings "That Silver Haired Daddy of Mine" in a scene from a medicine show.

You, too, can dress for Bluegrass success without getting into a Hollywood-style fistfight--assuming you will win—and besides, no violence is allowed at Bluegrass events! Also, no smokin', no drinkin' and no disorderly conduct.

The closest I ever came to that type of scenario was the memorable occasion when I had the privilege of getting chewed out royally by a retired Russian concert pianist—an older Type A personality lady who had been active during the heyday of Russian performing arts.

No room for errors—anywhere.

At the time, Mark and I had just started doing performances at nursing homes—where everything sounds wonderful to the audience and you can relax and have a good time. Not sure who had more fun—our little pickup band or the patients. No pressure to perform—great practice and good karma, too. I highly recommend it for musicians just starting out.

The Russian lady didn't ask me about the music. What she was curious about was our performance outfits. After all, we were in a sewing class and very fashion-conscious.

When I told her that I wore the same style of clothes that I had on, just jeans and a sweater, she pitched a hissy fit with her strong Russian accent and said emphatically, "You should always dress up for your performances!"

Thinking about it, I realized that she was right. Your outfit is actually a part of your performance.

Once a very famous country musician was scheduled to perform at a popular bar in Midtown Atlanta—and showed up looking just like a homeless person! And this gentleman had written my all-time favorite country song! Audiences can see such fashions as that on every street corner—what they want is to see someone all dressed up in something sharp and appropriate for the ambience of the event.

This can also extend to audience participation. Once the High Museum of Art here in Atlanta even offered an admission discount at their western art show to anyone who showed up in cowboy outfits—made it even more fun.

So I always dress up for my own performances. I start with a Stetson, and put on my cowboy boots for the event (and take them off afterward so I can actually walk). At the Atlanta Country Music Hall of Fame, many people were wearing their finest cowboy boots and, just like me, took them off after they got out of the hotel and put on athletic shoes for the drive home. "You, too!" I exclaimed to one cowboy in the parking lot. We must be realistic.

Denim shirts and trucker jackets are always a good choice, and ladies can embroider them for extra style. After embroidering my own denim jackets, I wear them until they fall apart, and then start on another one. Denim shirts are somewhat easier to embroider, depending on the weight of the fabric. You can also find colorful appliques at fabric stores and simply sew them on. The Goodwill stores always have denim shirts and jackets on the racks at very reasonable prices—as well as other items you might like.

Silver and turquoise jewelry is appropriate for bluegrass and country events. You can easily make your own necklaces,

bracelets, and earrings with very basic materials such as beading wire, crimp beads, toggle catches, and crimp pliers. Bead shows and some craft stores have many beautiful beads to choose from. Freshwater pearls are surprisingly affordable. Or you can reassemble vintage necklaces and bracelets in your own designs. Always get the right starting materials. Before I learned how to do it right, I tried to string some agate beads from an estate sale with fishing line and dental floss—an exercise in frustration.

Instructions are available online.

So always dress up for your performances—and make a fashion statement at any bluegrass event, regardless of whether you are on the lineup or not.

Makes for lots more fun.

Musician Injury Research


