The best and most time honored way of learning Bluegrass Music is to gather with other players and singers, be a part of a group, and soak it in. This has worked for years and years and it still does, today.

However, for some of us, gathering with other musicians is not convenient and doesn't happen often enough to suit us for growing in the music the way we want to.

So, cue the Internet.



<u>YouTube</u> can be your friend. For almost every Bluegrass song or instrumental tune you can think of, someone has done a video of it. This can be a great resource for learning new songs but in many cases the videos are made by people who enjoy playing at 40 elebem million miles an hour!! Not so good if you are trying to learn.

So, cue the Internet, again.

To find slower versions, do a Web search or YouTube search for a song or tune name and include the word **Lessons**. For example, a YouTube search for **Fiddle Lessons** gives you many places to start your explorations. There are lots of folks out there offering step-by-step learning for almost any song or tune you would expect to run into at a Jam. A word of advice - if you start a lesson that doesn't seem to be



working for you, just drop it and go on for another person teaching the same music. Every teacher has a personal way of teaching – some will resonate with you and some won't. Do it however it works for you.

There are also browser extensions/add-ons like <u>Enhancer for YouTube</u>[™] which allow you to slow down or speed up the playing speed of a YouTube video. I find this amazingly helpful!

Perhaps you are a person who learns better by eye than by ear.

So, cue the Internet, again.

There are many print resources that can give you words, chords, and melody lines for most of our Bluegrass songs and tunes. With these songbooks and other resources, you can take your time and learn new songs at a speed that fits your learning style.

The big bookstores like <u>Amazon</u> or <u>Powells</u> or others will be glad to sell you books that can show you the songs. Know the name of a song? Do a search in a big on-line store like this to find it.



However, if you are like me and prefer to look for free options, read on.


Instrumentals

ABC Tune Finder - John Chambers' all-inclusive ABC tune finder, a comprehensive search engine for finding instrumental tunes on the web. Type the name of the tune in the search box and be amazed! <u>trillian.mit.edu/~jc/cgi/abc/tunefind</u>

Want more tunes with notes? Do a Web search by tune name and include the word: **notation**. Like this - **Ashokan Farewell notation** or **Old Home Place guitar tab** or **Little Maggie banjo tab**. You will find some paid options and some free options. Use whatever suits you.

If you are expecting a big crowd for dinner, make a triple batch — these cookies won't last long!

Ingredients

140 g (1 cup)whole wheat flour50 g ($\frac{1}{2}$ cup)cocoa powder $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoonbaking soda150 g ($\frac{2}{3}$ cup)butter175 g ($\frac{1}{2}$ cup + $\frac{1}{3}$ cup) granulated sugar1 teaspoonpure vanilla extract

1 largeegg½ teaspoonsalt½ cupchopped walnutsdash of Sweetwater Shine® 100 proofShredded coconut for sprinkling

Instructions

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350°F (177C°). Line baking sheet with parchment paper.
- 2. Put the flour, cocoa powder, salt, and baking soda into a small bowl and mix well.
- 3. Melt the butter in a small pan in a double boiler. Set aside to cool.



Dear Editors,

At a recent banjo jam, the question came up about the name of a chord. We were exploring various modal tunings, and what would happen for instance if you tuned the B string up to C (see next page). Now a G chord becomes a G with a sharped 3^{rd} . We already knew that if you flat the 3^{rd} , you get G minor; but sharp what is that?


The short answer, as your readers are probably shouting out right now, is "G sus 4" (being short for "suspended fourth", but why it is called that is left as an exercise for the student).



So, in this "modal" tuning, G major is replaced by G sus 4 in most of your strums.


Well, being a college educated boy who took two semesters of Music Theory in my freshman year of, um, lessee now, MCMLXXIII, I was curious as to what happens next. Like, what if you fool with the fifth, etc.? Congratulations, you will be the beneficiary of my research.

In the next example, we leave the third alone, and alternately flatten and sharp the fifth.



Flatting the fifth alone gives you something weird; that G doesn't belong in a B sus 2; it should be an F#. But it's banjo music, so deal. Sharp the fifth and you get "G augmented", a common nice sounding chord. The companion to that is "G diminished", which coincidentally is what you get next, flatting both the third and fifth. Lastly, if you sharp both the third and the fifth, you get our old friend C minor (inverted, with G at the bottom).

Did I say "lastly"? Ha. There are also the "G minor augmented fifth", and an unnamed tone cluster that doesn't sound as bad as it looks, in the right context. (One like it shows up in Gershwin's piano concerto, and nobody's complained about it yet.)


Sawmill Tuning

If you are a banjo picker, you might be tempted to try to learn Clawhammer style

(<u>https://blog.deeringbanjos.com/what-is-clawhammer-banjo</u>). After all, this was the way banjos were originally played when they first arrived here from Africa and before.





Once you learn the basic strum pattern, you will soon find that many Clawhammer banjo players use different tunings for different melodies. These tunings go far beyond the commonplace "*put on a capo and spike up your fifth string*" in *G* tuning. Some of these alternative tunings are named after a specific melody. For example, D tuning is frequently called "**Reuben**" tuning because "Reuben" is usually played in that tuning. Another common tuning is called "**Sawmill**" tuning (gDGCD). From standard *G* tuning, raise the 2nd string from B to C (one fret). This is also called "**G Modal**" tuning (see Page 10).

But why is it called "Sawmill" tuning?

A contributor to a banjo website speculated that there is probably a song called "Sawmill" that is played in that tuning. Apparently the contributor had never heard that particular song. There are numerous songs that can be played in that tuning including "Pretty Polly," "Omie Wise," "Cluck Old Hen," "Shady Grove," "Cuckoo," "East Virginia Blues," "Clinch Mountain Backstep," and "Red Rocking Chair." There are many others that can be played in Sawmill tuning, and of course many of these can be played in standard G tuning as well.

There is a video on the web of Tommy Jarrell playing "Cluck Old Hen." (<u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=W9aVxnlwYI4</u>) He says where he was raised they called it "the Sawmill Tune." Even though he plays it in what he calls "the old-time A tuning", "Cluck Old Hen" is one of those songs that is frequently played on banjo in Sawmill tuning.

This brings up the age-old question: Which came first the "Old Hen" or the "Sawmill"? You decide!






