

GENESIS: THE ORIGINS OF A SONG

Auld Lang Syne

by Mary Calvert Brown (aka Lady Outlaw)

Auld Lang Syne thrilled the soul of Robert Burns in the 1780s and today has become a New Year's Eve anthem sung by Bluegrassers and everyone else, evoking a sense of belonging and fellowship tinged with nostalgia. In 1799, it was set to a traditional tune, which has since become the standard.

The song begins by posing a rhetorical question: Is it right that old times be forgotten?

The phrase "auld lang syne" roughly translates from Scottish as "old long since", or "days gone by", and depicts preserving old friendships and looking back over events of the past. There is no specific reference to the new year.

Traditionally, it is sung to bid farewell to the old year at the stroke of midnight on New Year's Eve, particularly in the English-speaking world. By extension, it is often heard at funerals, graduations, and as a farewell or ending to other occasions.

Robert Burns sent a copy of the original song to the Scots Musical Museum in 1788 with the re-

mark, "The following song, an old song, of the olden times, and which has never been in print, nor even in manuscript until I took it down from an old man." Some of the lyrics were indeed "collected" rather than composed by the poet; the ballad Old Long Syne printed in 1711 by James

Watson shows considerable similarity in the first verse and the chorus to Burns' later poem, which is almost certainly derived from the same "old song".

It is a fair supposition to attribute the rest of the poem to Burns himself. There is some doubt as to whether the melody used today is the same one Burns originally intended, but it is widely used in Scotland and in the rest of the world.

Singing the song on Hogmanay, the Scottish New Year's Eve celebration, very quickly became a custom that spread throughout the British Isles and eventually worldwide.

At Hogmanay in Scotland, it is common practice that everyone joins hands with the person next to them to form a great circle around the dance floor. At the beginning of the last verse (And here's a hand, my trusted friend/and give a hand o' thine!), everyone crosses their arms so that the right hand reaches out to the neighbor on the left and vice versa. When the tune ends, everyone rushes to the middle, while still holding hands. When the circle is re-established, everyone turns under the arms to end up facing outwards with hands still joined. The tradition of singing the song when parting, with crossed hands linked, arose in the mid-19th century among Freemasons and other fraternal organizations.

Outside Scotland the hands are often crossed from the beginning of the song, at variance with Scottish custom. The Scottish practice was demonstrated by Queen Elizabeth II at the Millennium Dome celebrations for the year 2000. Some press outlets berated her for not "properly" crossing her arms, unaware that she was correctly following the Scottish tradition.

The first recording of the song was made on wax cylinder in 1898 by the Englishmen Charles Samuel Myers and Alfred Cort Hadden, who sang it in a demonstration of the new technology while on an expedition to record Aboriginal Australian music.

The original recording can be heard online via the British Library Sound Archive website.

The first commercial recording was most likely that of Frank Stanley, who recorded the song in 1910.

Songwriter George M. Cohan quotes the first line of the song Auld Lang Syne in the second to last line of the chorus of You're a Grand Old Flag.

John Philip Sousa quotes the melody in the Trio section of his 1924 march Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company.


British soldiers in World War I trenches sang We're Here Because We're Here to the tune of Auld Lang Syne.

Guy Lombardo and His Royal Canadians performed it on New Year's Eve for decades from 1929 until his death in 1977. Lombardo's 1947 Decca Records version is played in Times Square every New Year's celebration immediately following the dropping of the ball.

This tune was used briefly in the 1930 Mickey Mouse cartoon The Chain Gang.

As a standard in music. Auld Lang Syne has since been recorded many times, in every conceivable style, by many artists, both wellknown and obscure.

Seasoning your Bluegrass

Although not one of the traditional Bluegrass instruments, the small harmonica has found its way into many Bluegrass tunes and jam sessions, and has been featured by Doc Watson and the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band.





Fun, portable, and always in tune, harmonicas add spice and flavor to ordinary dishes of music, whether bluegrass, folk, Americana, blues or pop. I like to think of harmonica as a flavoring that you want to use in just the right amount. Too much can ruin the recipe.

The harmonica you'll see most of the time is a diatonic - built to be in a specific key. The harmonica must match the key of the song (with some exceptions) so that's why you'll always hear me asking "what key?" so I know which harmonica to grab. As I also play guitar, if I can catch a glimpse of the chords someone is playing, the key can be known from that.

Often I will play along with the melody throughout, but softly (remember it's a spice, not an entrée), to make sure I am getting the melody correct. Then if I get called to play a break, I'm ready to just raise the volume.

Harmonica can also be used to support the rhythm on the off beats like, say, a mandolin might. Diatonic notes are arranged so that blowing 3 holes together forms the key (I) chord while drawing 3 holes forms the V chord.

You just chug those chords to provide off-beat emphases.

I learned harmonica back in the sixties, inspired by Bob Dylan who always had one around his neck. When I first started, Hohner Marine Band harmonicas were \$4.95. Now they're about ten times that, and you need one for each key you expect to be playing in. The minimum effective kit would be four, I think – A, G, C, and D.

Small and light, it's easy to stick one in your pocket to take on a hike for instance and play around the campfire.

Sometimes at a jam there might be more than one harmonica player on hand; when so, we can take turns playing breaks or do a duet. The harmonica, with its twenty notes, covers two octaves so one of us can go low while the other goes high.

IF you want to learn to play harmonica, start with a D or G and get a good one – my favorite is the Hohner Special Twenty for volume, depth and richness. Watch a few YouTube videos on tongue-blocking and practice running scales until you get a feel for the instrument. If you can carry a melody in your head, and whistle or hum it, you can play a harmonica.

And here's some reassurance: all the notes are in the same key so it's hard to go wrong! If you hit a note a step too high or too low for what you intended, just slide into the correct note as if you meant to all along.



Fake it till you make it - that's what I do!


